

## Weinstein Hospice partners with Visiting Nurse | Hospice Atlanta

**W**einstein Hospice, a nonprofit organization serving patients at home in metro Atlanta, has never had an inpatient facility, but its leadership team has found a unique way of caring for people who need inpatient care. It is now partnering with another nonprofit, Visiting Nurse | Hospice Atlanta, which has such a facility. Weinstein patients who need inpatient unit care can now enjoy the peaceful surroundings and quality care of the beautiful, 36-bed Hospice Atlanta Center in Buckhead.

When Weinstein Hospice patients are admitted to the Hospice Atlanta Center, their medical needs are managed by the Hospice Atlanta team. As a result of this new agreement, the Jewish population has the option of a Jewish social worker and a rabbi managing the psychosocial and spiritual care of the patient and family.

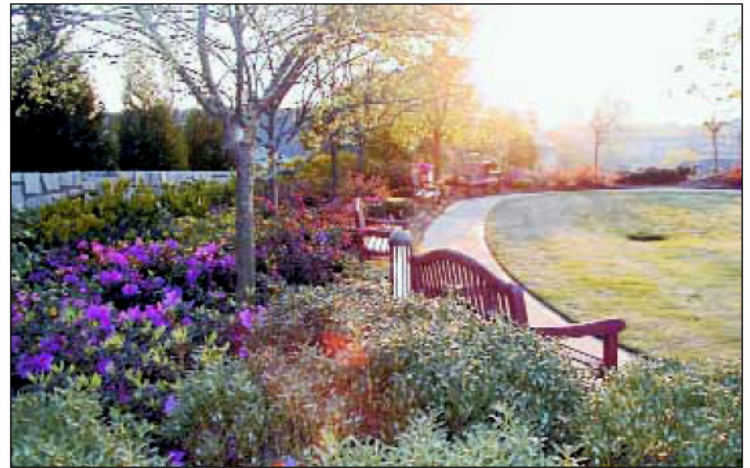
Weinstein Hospice was launched in 1999 by the Jewish community, but has always been inclusive of other faiths. Visiting Nurse |
